JFL LAUNCHES COMMUNITY-WIDE EMERGENCY RELIEF LOAN PROGRAM

In a time of crisis, Jewish Free Loan is here for our community. As COVID-19 made its way to Arizona, and continues to impact individuals and families, we have implemented our emergency protocols to expedite requests for assistance.



THE JEWISH FEDERATION OF GREATER PHOENIX PROVIDES \$40,000 FOR JFL'S COVID-19 RESPONSE

JFL is thankful to the Jewish Federation of Greater Phoenix for their generous grant which is helping to support our efforts to provide interest-free loans to Jewish individuals and families in financial distress. The money was awarded as part of the Jewish Federation of Greater Phoenix Emergency Fund which was created in direct response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

EMERGENCY LOANS/COVID-19 RESPONSE BY THE NUMBERS

MARCH

• 9 Emergency Loans totaling \$22,755

APRIL

- 12 Emergency Loans totaling \$55,035
- 40 Grocery Gift Cards donated to BJE and JFCS Passover food boxes for low income households

• Household goods (including toilet paper, sanitizer and toiletries) distributed to borrowers in need

"THERE IS NOTHING LIKE JEWISH FREE LOAN." —LEGACY SOCIETY MEMBERS, HANNAH & PHIL ADELMAN



"I was an infant when she started taking me, day-by-day, to collect the money," Hannah Adelman says as she recounts her first memories of Jewish Free Loan. For Hannah's entire life she, and now her husband, have been involved in the free loan movement. When Hannah was a newborn, her mother would take Hannah along as she visited the local jeweler to collect money, which would then be distributed as a loan to an individual in need. Once that individual was able to begin paying the loan back, Hannah's mother would take the money in reverse, from borrower back to the lender. This was the beginning of Hebrew Free Loan of Northeast Ohio. "I was so young, I just thought this was what people did. As I got older, I realized not everyone did what we were doing."

Over 80 years later, Hannah has remained involved with Jewish Free

Loan. For both Hannah and Phil, the organization holds a special place in their hearts. They are proud to be among the first members of JFL's Legacy Society. As Hannah says, "There is nothing like Jewish Free Loan."

From generation to generation, Hannah and Phil have contributed to the impact interest-free lending has on the Jewish community by continuing the legacy of Hannah's mother and grandmother. This year, Jewish Free Loan celebrates 70 years of service in Phoenix and throughout Arizona. It is people like the Adelmans who ensure that we will be here to make a difference for generations to come.
